#### Communication & Language:

Listen and respond to a simple instruction.

Start to say how they are feeling, using words as well as actions.

Start to develop conversation, often jumping from topic to topic.

Can start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.

Listen to simple stories and understand what is happening, with the help of the pictures.

## Literacy:

Notice some familiar print, such as the first letter of their name.

Enjoy drawing freely.

Enjoy sharing books with an adult.

Pay attention and responds to the pictures or the words.

#### Physical Development:

Develop manipulation and control.

Explore different materials and tools.

Gradually gain control of their whole body through continual practice of large movements.

Sit on a push-along wheeled toy, use a scooter or ride a tricycle.

# Understanding the World:

Make connections between the features of their family and other families.

Notice differences between people.

Continue to develop positive attitudes about the

differences between people.

Use all their senses in hands-on exploration of natural materials


Talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary.
